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Burns shakes loose Vision 2025 emails, proves Afghan refugee plan was highly developed

Something didn't smell right to Rep. Burns when the Vision Together 2025 group began explaining its Afghan refugee recruitment plan after news of its existence trickled out late last year. His suspicions grew when Vision 2025 leaders berated anyone who asked questions or didn't fall in line – including Rep. Burns, who in January called for a public hearing on the controversial plan.

While supporting others in the community who pressed for more details – and who uncovered Vision's elaborate "Human Capital Plan" that included learning about the Section 8 Program and housing vouchers – Rep. Burns made his own Right-to-Know Law request of the state Department of Human Services.

Rep. Burns' effort yielded emails from Vision 2025 CEO Mike Tedesco, who wrote in early November that

 a direct contradiction of the nonprofit corporation's public statements that their plan was only in the preliminary stage.

Rep. Burns continues to call for full transparency from Vision 2025, starting with making its board meetings public. He also thinks elected officials serving on Vision 2025's board of directors have a serious conflict of interest, and should decide which hat they want to wear.

Mike Tedesco, President and CEO of Vision Together 2025 Internal Emails vs. Public Comments

In private, Tedesco said:

"What follows is a proposed plan to prepare for and accept incoming refugees and immigrants. Prepare for up to 100 Afghani families."

Stressing that he voted against increasing the state gasoline tax several years back, Rep. Burns favors suspending the tax – which is among the nation's highest – in order to help drivers deal with skyrocketing prices that top \$5 a gallon.

Unlike some others in Harrisburg to whom money is no object, Rep. Burns deals with the same pain at the pump as the people he represents. Just like you, he knows what it's like to pay twice as much to fill up your car, because he does so himself.

Rep. Burns views a gas tax suspension as a sensible way for the state, which is flush with cash, to help struggling households deal with the inflation wrecking many household budgets.

To increase supply, Rep. Burns has supported additional domestic production, urging the federal government and president to allow more drilling.

- When the nonprofit Vision Together 2025 formulated in secret a plan to recruit Afghan refugees to Cambria County, Rep. Burns called for full transparency and public hearings. He also used the state's Right-to-Know Law to obtain documents proving Vision 2025 wasn't being honest and their plan was way more advanced than it had claimed in news articles.
- When a group of seniors came to Rep. Burns for help after CamTran cut their bus service, he didn't ask if they were Republican or Democrat before Rep. Burns successfully fought to get seniors' bus service restored.
- When residents opposed the Johnstown Water Authority's plan to construct a windmill farm in Upper Yoder Township, Rep. Burns sided with residents to STOP the plan.
- When the state was threatening to close the Ebensburg Center's doors, Rep. Burns met with residents' families and the facility's workers – then Rep. Burns went to work to save the center and its 700 jobs.

Rep. Burns has proven he is not afraid to take on government agencies, local authorities or large corporations on behalf of the people he represents.

Burns brings Dolly Parton library to Cambria

Rep. Burns worked more than a year, cultivated a sponsoring partner in Saint Francis University and secured a \$50,000 state grant to help bring the Dolly Parton Imagination Library to Cambia County.

Burns' office has resolved over 112,000 constituent issues

While proud of the 112,257 issues he and his office have resolved, Rep. Burns has applied a broad and ever-expanding definition of "constituent service" to his job, impacting those who haven't yet walked through his door or phoned for help.

Rep. Burns goes door to door in neighborhoods just to listen to peoples' concerns. That's how he knows one of the top concerns in our area is crime – and that people are alarmed over the recent rise of violent incidents. This led Rep. Burns to call for the hiring of more police officers as nobody should have to live in fear.

Keeping everyone safe is a huge part of his focus, so Rep. Burns' solid track record includes securing:

- + \$5.49 MILLION for FIRE COMPANIES AND EMS PROVIDERS in his legislative district.
- + \$1.83 MILLION for POLICE AND LAW ENFORCEMENT, including school safety and combating sexual violence.

Burns helps 100,000 seniors pay for prescription drugs

Rep. Burns knows how hard it is for seniors on fixed incomes to pay for the medicine they need – so he voted to make 100,000 more of them eligible for the state's PACENET program.

This was accomplished by increasing the income eligibility limit by \$6,000 – to \$33,500 for singles and \$41,500 for married couples. And there was no added cost to taxpayers, since the PA Lottery funds the program.

The change Rep. Burns supported means 350,000 low-income seniors are now eligible for PACENET, a 40% increase from the 250,000 currently enrolled.

Burns on front line of saving Ebensburg State Center



Because of Rep. Burns' vigilance and fighting

spirit, the Ebensburg State Center – where 700 people work and nearly 225 mentally and physically disabled adults receive care – was kept open in 2017 and received a legislative reprieve in 2020.

Rep. Burns successfully fought back against the state's 2017 closure plan – even issuing an invitation to Gov. Tom Wolf to tour the facility and look the people who would be affected in the eye, as Rep. Burns had already done.

Then, in 2020, Rep. Burns joined in bipartisan support for a bill to enact a moratorium on the closure of such facilities. It also required the appointment of a task force to evaluate the state centers and provide recommendations to the Department of Human Services PRIOR to any closure.

Rep. Burns stands with employees, patients and their families, and will jump headfirst into the fray to beat back any fresh attempt to close the center.

Burns brings No. 1 economic development tool in the country to Cambria County, allowing region to compete for jobs

Rep. Burns was instrumental in getting 375 acres approved for a Keystone Opportunity Zone in Cambria County – positioning us to compete on a level playing field with other regions in PA by offering tax incentives for businesses to locate or expand here.

To Rep. Burns, this important designation gives our county something to present as a reason for companies to set up shop – and provide good-paying jobs – in Cambria instead of somewhere else.

But Rep. Burns didn't stop there. He made sure Cambria's KOZ could include parcels of any size, making small towns and cities with blighted parcels of land eligible for KOZ status to aid in their rebirth.

Drug-fighting effort yields hundreds of arrests

A supporter of the program since its 2014 inception, in partnership with Cambria County Crime Stoppers, Rep. Burns offers free "Push out the Pusher" yard signs by calling his Ebensburg office at 814-472-8021.

More than 500 arrests have resulted from citizens reporting illegal drug activity by calling the program's 1-800-548-7500 tip line, or by calling their local police department.

Rewards of up to \$8,000 are determined by police and the county's drug task force.

Burns urges Johnstown to hire more police

When he went door-to-door canvassing Johnstown earlier this year, Rep. Burns heard plenty from residents fearful over the city's high crime rate and increasing violence that included eight homicides by gunfire through May.

As a result, Rep. Burns urged Johnstown officials to use a portion of \$30.7 million in American Rescue Plan grant money to hire more police officers, bringing the streets under control and alleviating people's most-pressing fears.



Some are asking, 'How do we fund more police two years down the road?' when the real question that needs answered is, 'How do we help control this crime problem right now?'

When a person in Johnstown has a 1 in 62 chance of being a violent crime victim, compared to a 1 in 261 chance in all of Pennsylvania, and millions of dollars are available, Rep. Burns thinks immediate action is required.



Burns Protects Taxpayers

Rebuffs state's appetite for higher taxes

A firm believer that just like your household, state government should live within its means, Rep. Burns has never voted for a tax increase – not to be obstinate, but because he didn't think it necessary. Time and again, he's been proven right.

Rep. Burns remembers well the time he was punished by Gov. Wolf for voting against a proposed \$2 billion tax increase. The governor restricted vital services to people in the 72nd District, but Rep. Burns fought back and quickly got the services restored for the people he represents.

However, because of Rep. Burns' vote the tax increase was defeated – and just a few years later, we came to find out the tax increase wasn't necessary

If in bad times we ask people to pay more, in good times we should give some back – Rep. Burns.

Although it may be unique in Harrisburg, Rep. Burns' definition of "constituent service" includes helping you keep more of your money. He even introduced a plan to return a big chunk of the state's budget surplus to the taxpayers.
