

DID YOU KNOW?

Seniors **65 or older** are eligible to travel for FREE on all PA SEPTA service lines with a **SEPTA Key Card**.



My office is available to process **SEPTA Senior Key Card** requests.

SEPTA has extended for another year all SEPTA Key Senior ID Cards that expire in 2021 or that would have expired in 2020. Those cards are now valid until the expiration month in 2022.

Does the state have something that belongs to you?

The Pennsylvania Treasury has more than \$3.4 billion in unclaimed property belonging to the people of Pennsylvania. These items and funds go missing, often for things as simple as a misspelled name or an out-of-date address. Approximately one out of every 10 Pennsylvanians has unclaimed property with the state.

Examples of unclaimed property include closed bank accounts, uncashed checks, lost stocks and bonds, contents of safe deposit boxes, expired gift cards, and insurance policies

Property Tax/Rent Rebate

Applications are being accepted for rebates on property taxes or rent paid in 2020. The rebate program benefits eligible renters and homeowners 65 or older; widows and widowers 50 or older; and people with disabilities 18 or older. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 annually for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded.

Do you have difficulty paying for your prescriptions?

PACE, PACENET and PACE plus Medicare are Pennsylvania's prescription assistance programs for senior citizens. The programs offer low-cost prescription medication to eligible Pennsylvania residents who meet the income qualifications.
