## **INVESTING IN OUR STATE**

Over the summer, the state passed a budget bill for the 2023-24 fiscal year. No budget is ever perfect, but this bill delivers on some key priorities, including a historic \$1 billion investment in K-12 public education with funding to provide universal free breakfast for students in PA's public schools, and increases in the Basic Education Formula and Level-Up.

School districts in the 45th Legislative District are due to receive the following increases in funding:





Other highlights of this budget include:

- \$50 million in funding for the Whole-Home Repairs Program to allow folks to make critical improvements to their homes that they wouldn't otherwise be able to afford.
- \$136 million expansion to the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program to help older Pennsylvanians and those with disabilities afford to stay in their homes.
- \$23.5 million for workforce training and career & technical education.
- \$20 million increase for county mental health funding.

## PROPERTY TAX/RENT REBATE EXPANSION

For the first time in 17 years, Pennsylvania is expanding the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program. The expansion will help nearly 175,000 more Pennsylvanians qualify for PTRR – including about 16,500 seniors right here in Allegheny County – and many of the 400,000 seniors who already qualify will see their rebates nearly double.

Starting in 2024, the new law:

- Increases the income cap from \$35,000 to \$45,000 for homeowners.
- Increases the income cap from \$15,000 to \$45,000 for renters.
- Automatically increases the income cap to grow with inflation, beginning in claim year 2024.
- Increases the maximum rebate from \$650 to \$1,000.

The rebate amounts and income limits will increase with inflation, so no senior becomes ineligible just because their Social Security payment increased.

I am proud to support this long overdue expansion that will help so many folks in our community remain in their homes.

## HOUSE GAME AND FISHERIES COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSON







I am honored to have been appointed as majority chair of the House Game and Fisheries Committee for the 2023-24 legislative session.

The committee works with the state Game and Fish and Boat commissions – independent entities that are largely self-funded by license purchases and fees – to review bills that ensure the interests of hunters and anglers are well represented.

Sportsmen and women have long heard the call of the outdoors here in Pennsylvania, and as chair of this committee, I will work to honor their voices when it comes to hunting, fishing, and wildlife-related issues and policies.





In the spring, I joined conservation officers with the PA Fish and Boat Commission to help stock trout along the Montour Trail.









I traveled to Elk County for a meeting with some committee members, the PA Game Commission, the PA Fish and Boat Commission, and the Keystone Elk Country Alliance. The presenters discussed various issues, from elk and trout to basic wildlife management and funding concerns. After our meetings, we went to look for elk and saw several!

### HISTORIC BREAST CANCER SCREENING LAW

I was proud to support legislation that was later signed into law that will be a major step forward in the fight against breast cancer and help save lives.

Once it takes effect, Act 1 of 2023 will remove out-of-pocket costs associated with genetic testing for hereditary breast, ovarian, prostate, and other cancer syndromes – as well as supplemental breast screenings for women with a high lifetime risk of breast cancer.

This landmark legislation is the first of its kind in the nation and will ensure that critical healthcare will be accessible and more affordable for more Pennsylvanians.



## BRINGING MONEY BACK TO OUR COMMUNITIES

I am committed to advocating for state funding to address issues that are important to our communities and help them thrive. Since my last newsletter, I have helped to secure funding for the following:

## INFRASTRUCTURE & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- \$325,000 to Coraopolis Borough for reconstruction and improvements to Mill Street.
- \$200,000 to SunCap Property Group LLC for roadway improvements to support the Riverfront Industrial Development project in Stowe Township.
- \$500,000 to the McKees Rocks Community Development Corporation to remediate and stabilize the former bank building located at 602 Chartiers Ave.
- \$252,232 to Neville Township to support updating signal equipment at the intersection of Neville Road and Gulf Oil Co.
- \$500,000 to the Municipal Authority of the Township of Robinson to rehabilitate a raw water intake station.
- \$2 million to Welly LLC to purchase and/or renovate the existing industrial facility at 507 Forest Ave. in Scott Township for an insulated steel drinkware manufacturing line.

## POLICE, FIRE & FIRST RESPONDERS

- \$246,088 to McKees Rocks Borough for the purchase of four police vehicles, along with integrated vehicle and body cameras to improve safety and increase evidence quality.
- \$75,000 grant for Chartiers Valley School District to hire school resource officers.
- More than \$137,000 for fire and EMS companies in McKees Rocks, Kennedy Township, Robinson Township, Bridgeville, Stowe Township, Carnegie, Coraopolis, Neville Island, and Presto.
- More than \$346,000 for law enforcement equipment in Carnegie, Kennedy Township, McKees Rocks, and Bridgeville.

### **COMMUNITY INVESTMENTS**

- \$1 million to Rosedale Technical College in Kennedy Township to build out a second-level space that will require architectural and construction designs for additional classrooms.
- \$2 million for the Sports and Athletic Complex at Montour Junction in Coraopolis.
- \$2.25 million to Josh Gibson Foundation for the reconstruction and development of a new community center in McKees Rocks Borough.
- \$220,000 to Neville Township for the development of Neville Island Riverfront Park.
- \$1.6 million to preserve 40 affordable housing units at Coraopolis Gardens.
- \$400,000 to Carnegie Borough to upgrade a pavilion to Carnegie Park and add a storage shed to store municipal items and park equipment at Chioda Park.
- \$300,000 to Coraopolis Borough to replace outdated playground equipment and install a safety surface for the Ridge Avenue Tot Lot.
- \$460,000 to McKees Rocks Community Development Corporation, which works to create programs and places to meet people where they live and enable residents to reach full economic and social potential.
- \$13,750 to Junior Achievement of Western PA in Kennedy Township to provide programming to the McKees Rocks area through the Sto-Rox School District to help students succeed professionally and financially in life after school.
- \$55,000 to Boys & Girls Clubs of Western Pennsylvania to replace the roof of the main building in Carnegie for safer access for programs.
- \$180,000 to Coraopolis Community Development Corporation Inc. for revitalization efforts.
