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# PROBST SUPPORTS 2024-2025 STATE BUDGET WITH NO NEW TAXES

EDUCATION, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ARE PRIORITIES

The 2024-2025 state budget invests in a better future for all Pennsylvanians! We were able to increase funding for our schools, child care services, housing initiatives and mental health services. We're creating jobs and supporting our communities – and the small, local businesses that create the jobs. *And we did it all without new taxes or raising taxes.* This is a budget we can all be proud of!

The budget increases funding for 189th District school districts as noted on the graphic.

Among other highlights, the budget includes the following funding increases and new investments that will benefit Pennsylvania's schoolchildren.

This budget makes sure every child can learn in a safe and healthy learning environment by investing \$100 million to clean up and improve school facilities and eliminate health hazards like asbestos and lead, while also investing \$100

million for school safety and resources for students in crisis.

To address the lack of teachers entering the workforce, funding for the popular Student Teacher Stipend Program has been doubled to strengthen the teacher pipeline.

To help alleviate period poverty, which causes many students to skip school, menstrual products will be provided in schools.

I also want to highlight the budget's address of the affordable housing and homelessness crises with a \$5 million funding increase (27%) for homeless assistance with more investments in affordable housing and eviction prevention, and by increasing transfers for the PA Housing Affordability and Rehabilitation Enhancement (PHARE) annually to \$100 million after five years; and helping municipalities provide housing to residents in emergencies.



Ensuring that Pennsylvania's children have a home of their own will provide the essential foundation for their intellectual, social, emotional and physical health. As Pennsylvanians have a fundamental right to a high-quality education, so too do they have a fundamental right to a home of their own. It is a matter of justice. Let's get it done!

#### HERE'S A SNAPSHOT OF THE BUDGET'S INVESTMENTS

#### **EDUCATION**

- Historic Funding: We've allocated over a billion new dollars to public education, setting us on a path to rectify decades of underfunding and unfair funding as laid out by the state Commonwealth Court.
- \$100 million in special education funding.
- Solar for Schools: Solar for Schools Grant Program provides \$25 million to subsidize solar adoption in schools, reduce energy costs, and save districts hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

#### **HEALTH CARE**

- Making Mental Health a Priority: \$71 million for mental health services, including an increase of \$20 million for county-based mental health services.
- Supporting our Seniors: We secured \$75 million in increased funding for the care of seniors and adults with disabilities living in skilled nursing facilities.
- \$1.9 million to create the first Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Division within the PA Department of Aging.
- Almost \$2.5 million to address maternal mortality.

#### **HUMAN SERVICES**

- Intellectual Disabilities and Autism (ID/A) Resources: We've directed \$354.8 million towards resources, including \$74.8 million to clear the emergency wait list, ensuring Pennsylvanians receive the care they need.
- Supporting our Youth: We're directing \$26.2 million for subsidized childcare services.
- \$4 million for Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).
- \$55.6 million for Youth Development Institutions.

#### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

- Site Development: We've allocated \$500 million to site development.
- Main Streets and Commercial Corridors: \$20 million will revitalize these crucial areas.
- Minority-Owned Businesses: An additional \$20 million is set aside to support small, minority-owned businesses.
- · Lowering business taxes to help small businesses flourish.

#### **ENVIRONMENT**

- Clean Streams: \$50 million will go toward cleaning local streams.
- Abandoned Oil Wells: \$11 million is allocated for capping abandoned oil wells.
- DEP Permitting: \$10.5 million will expedite DEP permitting processes and clear backlogs.

#### **LABOR**

- Career and Technical Education: An increase of \$30 million in funding for CTE will provide more opportunities for skills development.
- Grow PA Scholarships: These scholarships, given to students who commit to work in PA after graduation, will ensure their skills are benefitting the Commonwealth.
- Labor Law Enforcement: Investments in labor law enforcement training will combat wage theft and hold bad employers accountable.

#### TRANSIT

 Funding for Public Transit: We've secured \$80 million to keep our public transit systems running.

#### CRIMINAL JUSTICE

 Community-Based Programs: Over \$50 million has been allocated for community-based programs to reduce violence.

#### PROBST SECURES GRANTS FOR PIKE COUNTY PROJECTS

I was pleased to help secure \$250,000 in state grants for the Pike County Economic Development Authority for the following projects:

- \$50,000, on behalf of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, to replace and renovate a playground on church property in Delaware Township.
- \$75,000, on behalf of the Pocono Environmental Education Center, to replace three existing outdated/dilapidated cabins at the center in Dingman Township.
- \$50,000, on behalf of Pocono Ranch Lands, to replace a water storage tank in Lehman Township.
- \$75,000, on behalf of the Glen at Tamiment, to replace drainage pipes in Lehman Township.



# WAS YOUR HEALTH INSURANCE CLAIM DENIED?

If you believe your health insurer wrongly denied a claim, you can now request an external review by the PA Insurance Department. The external review only applies to health insurance purchased through Pennie, directly from a health insurer, and commercial health insurance purchased by an employer.

You must complete the internal appeal process of your insurer before filing for an external review. If you are eligible, the PA Insurance Department will assign your request to a certified independent review organization. External review requests are free, and decisions are final and binding.

External review requests can be submitted online by visiting www.pa.gov/reviewmyclaim or you may download a paper request form from this website. You may also call the PA Insurance Department at (877) 881-6388 if you have questions or need further assistance.

Oct. 21 – Last day to register to vote in the General Election.

Oct. 29 – Last day to apply for a mail ballot.

**Nov. 5** – Election Day. Polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.



# DMVA CAN HELP VETERANS RETRIEVE LOST MILITARY DOCUMENTS

The Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs can assist veterans with locating their lost DD Form 214 (DD-214). This form is needed to verify military service for benefits, retirement, employment and more.

Anyone needing assistance from the DMVA to locate their DD-214/215, or other military documentation, can call toll-free (800) 547-2838 or e-mail RA-REQ@pa.gov. Another way to stay in touch is for veterans, family members and people who work with veterans to sign up for the DMVA's Veterans Registry by visiting www.register.dmva.pa.gov.

# INCREASING MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS 988 HOTLINE AVAILABLE 24/7

Did you know that 988 is a hotline developed for national suicide prevention and mental health crisis response? Unfortunately, many individuals experiencing a mental health crisis may not be aware of this critical resource. My colleague Rep. Tarik Khan and I will be introducing legislation to create a public awareness campaign to increase public understanding and engagement with the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline.

If you or someone you know is having a mental health crisis, please call 988. They are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

#### DOES THE STATE HAVE YOUR UNCLAIMED PROPERTY?

Did you know that the Pennsylvania Treasury is currently holding onto \$3.5 billion in unclaimed property?

Did you know that one in 10 Pennsylvanians is owed unclaimed property?

Did you know the average claim is worth about \$2,000?

My office is hard at work on trying to notify residents of their unclaimed property, but you don't have to wait for us to reach out. You can search Treasury's online database at any time to see if you or friends and family have property waiting to be claimed. You do not need to pay anyone a fee to search for or claim property from the state. Learn more at www.patreasury.gov/unclaimed-property.

#### KEEP MARKETS FAIR WHILE PROMOTING A HEALTHY ECONOMY

In early July, the state House of Representatives passed a bill designed to restrict monopolistic and collusive practices in PA marketplaces.

The Open Markets Act would allow the state attorney general to prosecute and penalize companies attempting to monopolize, restrict trade, limit competition, and engage in other practices that are largely unchecked in PA.

PA is the only state without an antitrust statue and that does a lot of economic damage to consumers, workers, and small business owners in PA. When companies collude or monopolize to dominate a market here, our current laws don't allow us to hold them accountable. This bill is centered around equipping PA's attorney general with the necessary tools to prosecute these bad actors so that working families don't have to bear the consequences of predatory practices like monopolization, lower wages, higher costs, price gouging, and fewer choices in the marketplace.

The bill passed the House by a bipartisan vote and awaits action by the state Senate.
