2024-2025 Budget Puts Students First

The 2024-2025 state budget was the first approved since the Pennsylvania Supreme Court issued a ruling that Pennsylvania was not living up to its constitutional obligation to fully fund public education. It was up to the General Assembly to allocate the resources needed to ensure the rights of our students. The budget took massive steps to doing exactly that, investing more than \$2 billion in our kids' education, leveling the playing field for disadvantaged school districts, creating safe school learning environments and improving mental health services for students in crisis.

For schools in our community, this means historic investments from Pennsylvania. The Allentown School District will see an increase of \$35.8 million in state investments. Since I took office in 2012-2013. this represents a 155% increase in Pennsylvania's commitment to Allentown schools.

Lehigh County Farmland Preservation Milestone

This year, Lehigh County's Farmland Preservation efforts hit a key milestone: 400+ farms and 28,000+ acres preserved! Started in 1991 with funding commitments from the state, Lehigh County, and in some cases municipal government, the owners of this land have made commitments to keep this land preserved as farmland for future generations. Congratulations to the farmers and leaders who saw the importance of helping ensure Lehigh County residents could benefit from these decisions.

Committee OKs Legislation to Stop Mega Development

At the beginning of this session, I reintroduced my legislation (HB 782) that would give local governments more tools to fight back against over-development of warehouses and sprawl in our communities. In June, that legislation was approved by the Local Government Committee of the House of Representatives. Members from across the state, who have seen the consequences of runaway development, shared stories about the loss of farmland and open space before casting their votes. The bill awaits action by the full House and a very steep climb, but I am committed to supporting the hard work of local officials who want to keep our communities and environment safe for future generations.



Landmark Energy Bills Introduced

This spring, I was part of a team of House members who introduced legislation that would create clean and reliable energy to save Pennsylvanians money on energy bills, create thousands of jobs, and reduce harmful pollution from our air and waterways. House Bills 2277 and 2275 are part of an effort that would cut emissions and help to deliver on Pennsylvania's constitutional promise for a safe environment.

Carpenters Apprentice Program: A few years ago, the Carpenters Training Facility opened and has been providing apprentice training in Lehigh County. Apprentice training includes learning and mastering the skills needed to prepare for a career that pays a family-sustaining wage. I recently had an opportunity to tour this training center. Somehow, nothing was damaged during this visit.

Rebates for Home Electrification and Energy Efficiency Expected in 2025

After submitting Pennsylvania's Priority Climate Action Plan to the federal government in March 2024, the Department of Environmental Protection expects rebates for home electrification and energy efficiency to be available in early 2025. These rebates are made possible by the Inflation Reduction Act passed by Congress and President Joe Biden. When they become available, rebates can be used to make energy efficiency upgrades to single and multi-family homes. 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Health Insurance Resources Available

As a result of the federal Affordable Care Act, health insurance has never been more available. Below is information about resources available in our community to help you with enrollment questions.

Medical Assistance — commonly called Medicaid — allows people with low or very moderate income to access health insurance through the Department of Human Services. To enroll, visit <u>Compass.PA.Gov</u> or give my office a call (610-821-5577) so we can send you the application. Income limits are based on household size.

Pennie is Pennsylvania's health insurance exchange, available for people who are not eligible for Medical Assistance, do not have access to health insurance through employers, or who have lost access to health insurance coverage. Visit Pennie.com or call 1-844-844-4440.

PA MEDI volunteers are trained by the Pennsylvania Department of Aging or county Agencies on Aging to help seniors get free, unbiased personalized help with Medicare. This can include initial Medicare enrollment when turning 65 or during open enrollment. Yearround assistance is available by calling the toll-free PA MEDI Helpline at 1-800-783-7067 during normal business hours.

Upload Emergency Contact Information

PennDOT's emergency contact information system allows you to enter two emergency contacts by using your driver's license or ID number. This gives first responders the ability to quickly reach someone who will speak for you if you ever cannot speak for yourself.
