With 2025 now well underway, I'm reflecting on what we've accomplished together over the past year—and looking ahead with optimism and determination for both the work we started last year and any new efforts to

Last vear we saw so many milestones for our community. With your support, I advanced legislation to protect **consumers** from unscrupulous subscription service tactics, expand health care access to ensure women are covered for breast and ovarian cancer screenings, and support our first responders by making sure they are reimbursed properly for the services they provide.

Funding for the projects that impact you

During my first term in office, I helped bring more than \$18 million back to the district for community projects by advocating for local organizations' grant requests. Here's a brief rundown of the projects that have been funded since my Fall newsletter:

- Delaware County Industrial Development Authority received \$800,000 to renovate the Emergency Department at Riddle Hospital in Middletown Township.
- Edgmont Township received \$240,500 to remediate the Cisler land tract and create more open space for community use.
- Radnor Township received \$500,000 to install a solar electrical generation system at its municipal building. It also received \$826,775 to repair aging infrastructure and improve accessibility at the Creutzburg Center
- Delaware County Intermediate Unit Career & Technical School received \$1,500,000 to replace dilapidated roofs at four school facilities.
- Radnor Township School District received \$2.550.000 to replace the outdated HVAC system at Radnor High School with a reliable energy-efficient system.
- Newtown Township received \$125,000 to replace the roof of the beloved Paper Mill House Museum, and \$10,000 to replant more than 60 trees along the Goshen Walking Trail.

Legislative Victories

Protecting you as a consumer

After learning about the growing problem of seniors getting fleeced by unclear agreements with subscription services, I worked with the state attorney general's office to create legislation (H.B. 2557) to protect people who sign up for online services by making sure they can clearly see how to terminate online contracts before being charged; and another colleague introduced a companion bill (H.B. 116) to require online merchants to clearly provide notice of automatic renewal agreements and instructions for ending subscriptions.

Both bills passed in the PA House with bipartisan support – but the state Senate decided not to consider either bill, which means we must re-introduce them in the current legislation session.

When PECO announced in March 2004 that it filed requests with the Public Utility Commission to increase electric and natural gas rates by 36% – which would have resulted in energy bills for the average consumer using both services to increase by about \$25/month – my colleagues in the Southeast and I mobilized our communities in response. We held public meetings, kept you updated via social media and e-newsletters, and educated you on how to advocate to the PUC. With the public's opposition loud and clear, the PUC approved increases much lower than what PECO requested: About 7% for electricity, and 12.5% for natural gas.



Looking out for your health

Hospital closures around our community as the result of health system mergers have reached a crisis point. Last year, the House passed my legislation (H.B. 2344) that would protect communities from losing access to vital health care services due to health system consolidations and closures by providing the state attorney general the ability to stop corporate mergers that would devastate the availability of health services and increase patient costs. The state Senate, however, failed to consider it. The problem isn't going away on its own, so this year we will renew the battle.

We did manage to get the Senate on board with a portion of our "PA Momnibus" bill package aimed at producing better maternal health outcomes. especially when it comes to Black women and their babies (PA currently has one of the worst Black maternal mortality rates in the country.) Gov. Josh Shapiro signed a bill I cosponsored (H.B. 2127) to create a public awareness campaign around perinatal and postpartum depression, a serious and often overlooked disorder.

Protecting survivors of domestic violence

I was so proud to earn bipartisan support on two of my bills to address domestic violence last year - one would give victims the option to terminate a rental lease early and/or change the locks or means of entry to their housing unit, while the other would waive the fees for

replacing critical state documents for victims who had these documents stolen or destroyed by their abuser. Both efforts were again thwarted by the Senate's inaction, but I've already re-introduced both bills for the current legislation session.
