Gov. Wolf's Budget Proposal

Gov. Tom Wolf's proposed 2015-16 state budget provides meaningful solutions to the state's budget problems. He goes back to the basics by focusing on jobs that pay; schools that teach; and government that works.

Highlights of the Governor's proposal include:

- Providing \$3.8 billion in school property tax relief for homeowners and renters, and completely eliminating school property taxes for 270,000 senior households by increasing the state sales and personal income taxes;
- Restoring devastating cuts to public education by investing \$400 million more in basic education, \$100 million more in special education, \$120 million more in early childhood education and saving schools \$160 million on charter costs;
- Expanding home- and community-based long-term care to enable more older Pennsylvanians to obtain care in their homes: and
- Restoring the Lottery Fund so the money is available to support programs for older Pennsylvanians.

The Governor's plan is a comprehensive and sustainable plan that moves Pennsylvania in the right direction. It does not rely on accounting gimmicks or harmful cuts to our state's most vulnerable citizens.

Gov. Wolf's budget lays a foundation for a thriving future, an educated workforce, and jobs that offer competitive wages. Rep. Sturla is eager to work with his colleagues and Gov. Wolf to make sure that the state is a quality place to live and work.

Rep. Sturla is a co-sponsor of House Bill 250 that would help Pennsylvania's struggling families by increasing the minimum wage to \$9 per hour and then to \$10.10 per hour one year after enactment. The bill also includes a cost-of-living increase to ensure the state's minimum wage keeps up with inflation.

Helpful updates to Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program

The Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program is one of the commonwealth's most popular programs. It allows eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 or older; widows and widowers age 50 or older; and people with disabilities age 18 or older to apply for a rebate on their rent or property taxes.

Thanks to Act 156 of 2014, which Rep. Sturla supported, income eligibility guidelines for the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program have changed so Social Security cost-of-living adjustments no longer disqualify those applying for a rebate. The Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program would be increased under Gov. Wolf's budget proposals.

If you receive Social Security and received a property tax/rent rebate last year, you should apply for the program this year.

The income guidelines for applying are \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 a year for renters, with half of Social Security, and now Social Security COLAs, excluded. The deadline to apply is June 30. More information is available at http://www.revenue.pa.gov. Please ignore any solicitation that seeks payment for help filing. Rep. Sturla and Acting Secretary Manderino also visited Thaddeus Stevens College of Technology. Stevens educates Pennsylvania's economically and socially disadvantaged, as well as other qualified students, for skilled employment in a diverse, ever-changing workforce and for full effective participation as citizens. The college provides a well-rounded, two-year education and is well-known for connecting more than 95 percent of students with gainful employment.

Keeping PA kids healthy with CHIP

The legislature made a smart investment in its children and future by voting to extend Pennsylvania's Children's Health Insurance Plan, also known as CHIP. The program will ensure that nearly 150,000 kids will get the health care coverage they need.

CHIP provides low-cost health insurance to all uninsured children and teens who are not eligible for medical assistance. The law extends CHIP through Dec. 31, 2017. Without this legislation, the program would have expired at the end of this calendar year.

Access to quality health insurance is an important tool to maintain health and wellness. With insurance coverage, children can receive regular physicals, vaccinations and other types of preventative care, ultimately reducing costly emergency room visits.

Just say no to head injuries

Bike helmets are required by state law for younger children and a good idea for everyone. Wearing a bike helmet while riding can reduce the risk of head injury by up to 85 percent.

Pennsylvania law requires children 12 or younger to wear a bike helmet. The law is supported by statistics that show that helmets are the single-most effective safety device available to reduce head injury and death. Non-helmeted riders are 14 times more likely to be involved in a fatal crash than helmeted riders.

Does the state have something that belongs to you?

Nearly one in 10 Pennsylvanians is estimated to have unclaimed property with the Pennsylvania Treasurer's Office. This property includes any financial asset that may have inadvertently been left with a bank, insurance company, business or organization.

Those entities are required to transfer such property to the state Treasurer's Office, where it will stay until the owner claims it.

To find out if the state is holding on to your unclaimed property, contact Rep. Sturla's office at 717-295-3157. You can also call 1-800-222-2046 or visit www.patreasury.gov/unclaimed/search.html to search the database. There is no charge to reclaim your property. Please ignore any solicitation from companies or individuals that attempt to charge you a fee to retrieve your property from Treasury.
