Governor Wolf Exercises Line-item Veto for

Lackiuster Budget Rejects Education Cuts and Funding Gimmicks of Years' Past

Work on the 2015-16 state budget lingers following the news that Governor Tom Wolf line-item vetoed the GOP's education cuts and would not continue out-of-balance spending practices used by the previous administration.

While the governor would not accept the status quo, he did authorize the flow of funding to schools, counties and human services. This will ensure that schools can continue to keep their doors open and our most vulnerable citizens will receive the services they desperately need as the impasse continues.

The budget sent to the governor is not sustainable. It includes a \$2.3 billion structural deficit that would continue to grow if the spending plan would have been signed into law. These GOP gimmicks would ultimately result in additional credit downgrades and fiscal instability in the state. It is not the path Pennsylvania can afford to continue to follow without serious consequences to our economic viability. There is a compromise budget agreement ready for consideration



that has bipartisan support in both the House and Senate. Senate Republicans and Democrats passed that budget and sent it to the House. House Republicans failed to bring that compromise up for a vote which ultimately forced a subpar budget to the governor's desk. Thankfully, Governor Wolf exercised his constitutional right to line-item veto the inadequate portions of the spending plan. We need to focus our efforts on the compromise agreement and get a full budget done that allows Pennsylvania to pay its bills, educate our children in a fair and equitable manner and ensures our most vulnerable residents have access to the programs they need.

Because of its fractured local governments,
Pennsylvania is home to more than half of the municipal
pension systems in the United States. This inefficiency
and other concerns have led to a \$7 billion unfunded
liability statewide. I met with Auditor General Eugene
DePasquale to discuss Pennsylvania's municipal
pension problem. Chaired by DePasquale, the Municipal
Pension Task Force released recommendations
including increasing transparency and accountability
for all pension plans; and helping with the recovery of

Improvements to CHIP Coverage

As a proud supporter of Pennsylvania's Children's Health Insurance Program, I am happy to announce that Governor Wolf updated the program to ensure that it includes all minimum essential benefits as outlined under the Affordable Care Act. These benefits include a prohibition on annual and lifetime limitations for specific services classified as essential health benefits. Before the minimum essential coverage requirements for



CHIP plans, there were limits for dental and orthodontic care, durable medical equipment, and glasses.

CHIP provides free, low-cost or at-cost health insurance coverage to uninsured children and teens who are not eligible for nor enrolled in Medical Assistance. There is no income limit for CHIP. If you cannot get health insurance for your child for any reason and do not qualify for Medical Assistance, your child qualifies for CHIP. Open Enrollment Period for Health Insurance

If you need health insurance, the Health Insurance Marketplace's open enrollment period is under way. You can sign up or make changes to existing policies through Jan. 31. Free Background Checks for Those Who Volunteer with Kids

If you volunteer and have routine and direct interaction with kids as part of a program, service or activity for children, please know that changes have taken effect to waive the two fees associated with the background checks that are now required by law.

As of July 25, 2015, the child abuse background clearance fees from the PA Department of Human Services (originally \$10) and the state police criminal background check (also originally \$10) are now waived for volunteers only. Basic Education Funding Commission Releases Recommendations

As a member of the Basic Education Funding Commission, I am proud to share with you that the 15-member commission issued a report and recommendations for tackling the disparity in funding Pennsylvania's schools.

The commission used a representative sample of school districts across Pennsylvania to determine their costs for various factors to be used as a guide in developing the new formula. Factors including student needs that often are not met in the community; median household income, tax capacity that recognizes a school district's ability to generate local tax-related revenue compared to the statewide median; student counts; English language learners; and poverty are part of the formula. Another crucial factor included goes beyond accounting for the

percentage of poor students to adjust for the level and concentration of poverty in a district and recognizes that students living in an area where poverty is concentrated

have additional educational needs.

Pennsylvania did not become the most inequitable state for funding education overnight and the formula will not correct the situation overnight either. With continued education funding increases over several years, this formula has the potential to help us meet Pennsylvania's constitutional requirement for providing a thorough and efficient education for all children.

Smart Borrowing for College Students

The Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA) recently rolled out Phase 2 of www.MySmartBorrowing.org. This first-of-its-kind tool helps to educate borrowers on matching their anticipated career's income with anticipated college debt costs. The tool also provides information on building a monthly budget, matching income to expenses, to help borrowers determine if they can afford the college of their choice. It's a great tool to help students have a better understanding of their financial outlook after college.

5 Tips to Encourage Smart Borrowing from PHEAA

- 1. Research job availability in the student's chosen field before selecting a major.
- 2. Research the expected salary in that career, find an affordable school and borrow realistically.
- 3. Carefully consider all types of financial aid.
- 4. Learn about the many loan options available before borrowing.
- 5. Inconsistent or untimely loan repayment could affect borrower's future.


Winter Roadway Safety

PennDOT will be working hard this winter to ensure safe road conditions for drivers, but they also want you to prepare for safe travels.

To prepare for winter driving, especially if long-distance travel is planned, motorists should carry an emergency kit including items such as non-perishable food, water, first-aid supplies, warm clothes, a blanket, cell phone charger and a small snow shovel. However, motorists should tailor their kits to any specific needs that they or their families may have. Consider adding such items as baby supplies, extra medication, pet supplies or even children's games.

If motorists encounter snow or ice-covered roads, they should slow down, increase their following distance and avoid distractions. Last winter, there were 552 crashes resulting in four fatalities and 279 injuries on snowy, slushy or ice-covered roadways where aggressive-driving behaviors such as speeding or making careless lane changes were factors in the crash
