Honoring a True Hero


In 2018, we tragically lost Abington's own Captain Samuel A. Schultz and three other Marines when a helicopter crashed during a military training exercise in California. Captain Schultz was 28 years old and had already spent many of his years in service to our nation.

Earlier this year, I was honored to announce that we are commemorating his life and dedication to his hometown and his country by renaming the former "Edge Hill Road Bridge" crossing over Old York Road/Route 611 as the "Captain Samuel Schultz Memorial Bridge."

As you pass over the bridge, be sure to look toward the sides to see the commemorative signs that were recently installed by an official act of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

I would again like to personally thank Captain Schultz's parents, Mitchell and Julie Schultz, for their participation, support, patience and friendship during the entire process of securing the necessary law and approvals allowing the bridge dedication to happen. A big "thank you" also goes out to Captain David Corrigan, USMC, Veteran and Military Affairs Representative for U.S. Representative Madeleine Dean, who was instrumental in helping to make sure all was properly handled. Also, additional thanks to the Abington Township Board of Commissioners, under the leadership of President John Spiegelman, for the Board's support and for President Spiegelman's personal attention to helping see this through.

May we always remember Captain Schultz and all those and their families who have made the ultimate sacrifice for our country.



In Pursuit of Social Justice Reform

During a worldwide pandemic, the May 25 death of George Floyd in Minneapolis police custody sparked national protests calling out the systemic racism that exists throughout our country.

On June 8, members of the Pennsylvania Legislative Black Caucus took over the House Floor in the state Capitol with a call for action on several reform bills that had languished in the House Judiciary Committee for far too long.

This act of courage ultimately led to swift and unanimous passage of House Bills 1841 and 1910, which were recently signed into law by Governor Tom Wolf. These social justice reform bills, which I proudly co-sponsored, ensure more thorough background checks for law enforcement applicants, establish an electronic database containing separation records of law enforcement officers so as to weed out those who've been removed from positions for nefarious reasons, require mental health evaluations with a focus on PTSD

of law enforcement officers, and require training for police officers on trauma-informed care, use of deadly force, deescalation, implicit bias and other key issues, procedures and techniques.

Our legislative pursuit of social justice and protections for all Americans is just getting started as we strive for safer communities across the Commonwealth that fully embrace a healthy, productive relationship with law enforcement.

This type of change can be attributed to the peaceful Black Lives Matter protests that have swept across the country, including in communities like our own Abington and Upper Dublin. The calls for social justice are being heard, though we all have a long way to go. I stand in unity with those seeking positive change, and I promise to continue doing everything I can do to help advance necessary legislation and promote equity and justice in Harrisburg.

Finding Ways to Give Back

One of the best parts of living here is getting to know all the thoughtful, kind-hearted residents of the 153rd Legislative District who want to help, and there are many wonderful community organizations that need our help now more than ever. My office usually organizes multiple donation drives throughout the year, benefiting community organizations like the ones shown to the right. VOTE BY MAIL

For the first time, Pennsylvanians were able to vote by mail in the June 2020 primary. This is a secure, convenient and safe option to ensure that your voice is heard from the comfort of your own home. Since we're not sure what the fall will bring regarding COVID-19, I highly encourage utilizing this option for the General Election in November. You can apply for a mail-in ballot online (votespa.com) – no excuse is required – or contact my office for a hard-copy paper application.

FILL OUT THE 2020 CENSUS

Every 10 years, the United States conducts a census. This count of U.S. residents helps determine how \$675 billion is spent by the federal government and how Pennsylvania is represented in Congress for the next 10 years.

You can help ensure that our community gets its fair share of funding by responding to the census either online at www.2020census.gov, by mail or over the phone. The deadline to respond has been extended to Oct. 9. Come fall, census takers will start interviewing households that have not responded to help make sure everyone is counted by December.

Funding based on the Census helps improve roads and bridges, access to quality public education and improves our public safety. So, make sure you get counted!
