

With a Divided Legislature, Compromise is Key in Harrisburg

It's no secret that the road to passing a bill through the legislature can be a long one. Each year, thousands of bills are introduced, most of which never get a hearing in a committee, much less a vote in the House chamber.

Getting a bill through committee, through the House, then through the Senate and onto the governor's desk is even more challenging this session, as the House is controlled by the Democrats while the Senate is controlled by the Republicans. This reality means that compromise is critical when it comes to passing laws.

Over the last year, as the House Majority Whip, I have worked hard to deliver as many bipartisan votes as possible that I believe will help increase opportunity and independence for people across our commonwealth. These efforts include several of my own bills and resolutions that I have either authored or co-written with legislative partners. Working together, I am pleased that so much of my own legislation has seen movement during this term so far. Here are some of these bills:



- HB 843 Modernizes urban search and rescue operations in Pennsylvania (passed the House in March with bipartisan support).
- **HB 181** Creates a paid family leave program for all workers in Pennsylvania (reported out of committee).
- **HB 1381** Amends and improves the state's juvenile justice system (reported out of committee).
- **HB 1463** Recognizes 911 dispatchers as first responders (passed the House in April with bipartisan support).
- HB 1481 Provides unemployment compensation to striking workers (passed the House in November with bipartisan support).

- HB 1665 Increases access to school counselor support for students in public schools (passed the House in March).
- HB 1479 Codifies the rights of people with disabilities in our commonwealth to accessible digital content on state and local government websites (passed the House in October with bipartisan support).
- HB 1806 Restores the threshold for welfare fraud grading (reported out of committee).
- HB 1943 Requires the disclosure of chemicals used in fracking fluids by oil and gas companies (reported out of committee).
- HB 2153 Updates the state's prevailing wage contract law for public works (reported out of committee).

- **HB 478** Requires child safety restraints in all truck classifications (passed the House in May with bipartisan support).
- HB 1834 Creates an office of the Executive Director within the Employment First Oversight Commission (passed the House in April with bipartisan support).
- **HB 1961** Updates the Uniform Parentage Act (reported out of committee).
- HR 260 House Resolution recognizing the 30th anniversary of AmeriCorps (adopted by the House in March with bipartisan support).
- HR 60 Recognizing 'Union Organizing Week' in Pennsylvania (adopted by the House in June 2023 with bipartisan support).

Advancing Public Safety in Western PA and in Our Communities

Castle Shannon receives \$125,000 state grant to help with firehouse upgrades; Mt. Lebo fire training facility moving forward thanks to \$200,000 state grant

We need to do everything possible to support our firefighters so they can spend more time training rather than fundraising. That is why I was very glad to support both the Mt. Lebanon Fire Department and Castle Shannon Fire Department in their efforts to secure state funding for key initiatives.

Over the last year, my team and I worked with Shannon to secure a \$125,000 state grant to help replace three outdated doors around their fire engine bay with new, energyefficient doors which will eliminate concerns about functionality and make sure their personnel can quickly and reliably respond to emergencies. And in Mt. Lebanon, we are excited to see that the commission will be moving ahead in the coming months with the installation of a new fire department training facility at their public works site with the \$200,000 grant we helped secure. As securing practice burn sites becomes more and more challenging, facilities like this will help make sure our firefighters get the training they need to respond when called upon.

Some of our departments are blessed to receive more funding from their municipalities, while others depend more heavily on fundraising. But running a department, purchasing apparatus, and crewing engines is not getting cheaper for anyone. As fewer and fewer people statewide sign up to be firefighters, we all must be aware of the limited time they have to answer calls, train, and sometimes to fundraise. One of those three likely needs to be eliminated entirely.

House passes bipartisan bills to update urban search and rescue; extend workers' comp for first responders

As a retired volunteer firefighter, I know that when an emergency happens, politics doesn't matter. What does matter is making sure you have the tools, personnel, and training to get the job done – and making sure everyone goes home afterwards. After the Fern Hollow Bridge collapse in 2022, I was approached by local firefighters about improving our urban search and rescue capabilities, especially in our corner of the state.

Working with a bipartisan group of legislators, we crafted HB 843, and after hosting press conferences and technical demonstrations, we were finally able to get this bill through the House with a strong bipartisan vote. This bill helps reorganize and strengthen our regional response to large-scale emergencies that require very specialized responses, a need that was recognized a couple of decades ago shortly after 9-11. It is now over in the Senate where I hope it will receive consideration soon.

Trauma is a real danger for our first responders and, due to stigma, lack of parity, and ignorance, has led to the deaths of more firefighters than from fires. This is why I worked hard to pass HB 1632, a bipartisan initiative that recognizes the dangers of post-traumatic

stress for our first responders and gives them workers' comp coverage when they qualify.

There was pushback against this bill from insurance companies, and I accept that there is a risk of increased premiums. But I still do not understand how we are comfortable asking first responders to come save us, and then buckling when it comes to making sure they are ok for doing so. The status quo is just unacceptable, and I hope the Senate picks this bill up soon.

Speaking of first responders, a bill that establishes 911 telecommunicators as first responders that I have offered for the last couple of terms passed the House recently. Telecommunication operators are a critical part of an effective emergency response, often providing life-saving information in a timely and clear fashion. However, they also can bear the brunt of a traumatic response, talking people through horrific incidents and living through those moments with them. That's why, going forward, they must be part of our overall understanding of effective response and receive the recognition and support they deserve. This bill also awaits action now in the Senate.



Supporting Workers, Families, and Labor

Across the Commonwealth and in Pittsburgh

Growing up, I remember how my family benefited when my mom got a union job that assured us healthcare benefits and a living wage. And as a former union member myself, I have always supported the rights of workers to make their own decisions. Over the past year, my caucus has advanced more pro-worker legislation in the House than in the prior decade combined, largely finding bipartisan support for almost every initiative. And we aren't done yet.

With Labor Day on the horizon as I write, I look forward to once again marching in our nation's largest Labor Day Parade right here in Pittsburgh. This is an important event that reflects our region's history but also our future, as we must have strong American businesses grow alongside our skilled workforce and with as much American-made

product as possible. Organized labor led the way in establishing our middle class, and in this age of income inequality we need them to again help to forge a new compact with our businesses that most assuredly recognizes that real economic success includes us all.

Pro-Worker Bills Pass the House

These are some of the pro-family, pro-worker bills that have passed the House in the last year.

- **HB 299** creates the Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health Act, which establishes workplace safety standards for public sector employees that are consistent with federal OSHA requirements.
- HB 413 increases specifications for classifying employees as independent contractors in the construction industry.
- **HB** 577 creates the Keystone Saves Plan a voluntary retirement account for workers who don't have access to an employer-based plan.
- HB 760 allows workers' compensation claimants to have benefits delivered via direct deposit.
- HB 930 ensures that workers who suffer from serious and permanent disfigurement are eligible for workers' compensation benefits, increases the number of eligible weeks for compensation, and allows claimants to collect disability and disfigurement benefits simultaneously.
- HB 950 guarantees workers the right to organize and collectively bargain and prohibits any other laws that may interfere with or diminish collective bargaining rights.
- HB 1449 establishes clear requirements that firms bidding on public infrastructure projects must meet, including having a state or federally registered apprenticeship program.
- HB 1465 applies prevailing wage rates and minimum safety standards to all contracted construction work on underground systems regulated by the Pennsylvania Utility Commission.
- **HB 1481** extends eligibility for unemployment compensation to workers who are unemployed due to a work stoppage.

A Plan to Fix the State's Juvenile Justice System

In 2021, the state's bipartisan Juvenile Justice Taskforce issued a report that confirmed what many of us had already known -- that despite the best efforts of many, our juvenile justice system is falling short for too many of our kids.

Their research concluded that too many kids were needlessly detained, most with little or no prior history; that children of color were disproportionately impacted; and that the longer a child stayed in the system, the worse the results. This obviously is not acceptable.

Subsequently, the taskforce made 35 recommendations across a couple of sections of law, which they stated would not only improve outcomes and reduce out-of-home placement by 39 percent, but would do so while also saving taxpayers \$80 million.

Earlier this year I held an event in Pittsburgh to

talk about the findings and recommendations of the taskforce, as well as my bill, HB 1381, which reported out of the House Judiciary Committee and enact many of those recommendations. We had a fantastic discussion with state Sen. Jay Costa, along with state and national experts and advocates to talk about some of the changes we can make to address the system's shortcomings and improve outcomes for families, youth, and communities. I sincerely hope that the work of this bipartisan taskforce will not be forgotten, and that HB 1381 will make it to the governor's desk.

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Dormont Hollywood Theater Awarded State Grant


Building strong, resilient communities isn't just about supporting local businesses, but also the organizations that create the sense of community that binds us together. Earlier this year, with the support of state Sen. Wayne Fontana, we were able to announce a major state grant for Dormont's historic Hollywood Theater, which is undergoing renovations with a targeted re-opening for the end of this year.

The \$260,000 state grant, awarded through the commonwealth's Gaming Economic Development Tourism Fund, will enable the nearly 100-year-old theater to add accessibility features including a wheelchair lift; wheelchair and companion seating; closed captioning and hearing-impaired devices; a projector; and other renovations to the theater.


Upcoming Events!
