

Back in March we had a very successful Veterans Breakfast at the Phoenixville County Club. Thank you to everyone who attended! I am also very appreciative of U.S. Rep. Chrissy Houlahan and state Rep. Joe Webster, who are both veterans themselves, for participating and sharing their insights. The conversations were impactful. We hear the concerns with what is happening at the VA with the federal cuts and are fighting them for you.

We also spoke about legislation to support farmers, manage food processing residuals, promote farmland preservation, and address the market impacts from policy changes and the economic pressure on farms and farmers.

We partnered with the North Coventry Township Police Department, Sycamore International, Chester County Food Bank, and Wiggins Shredding to offer this community service. 
# PA IS WITHOUT A STATE BUDGET

As of this writing, Pennsylvania's budget stalemate has stretched some 90 days past the June 30 deadline.

The General Assembly is divided. The House approved a fiscally responsible budget bill in June, but the Senate has yet to act. Instead, it advanced a plan that would effectively cut resources to our schools, law enforcement, hospitals, transit, mental health services, and many other community programs from the previous year.

Shortchanging the Commonwealth – the 20th largest economy in the world – would be shortsighted and harmful, especially when the federal government is cutting resources to these programs.

...Yeah, that's a bad idea.

# **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE**

## **Growing Our Local Economy**

I'm committed to making Pennsylvania an easier place to start and run a business. I believe we need to do everything we can to ensure our state is a place where people want to put down roots and create good-paying jobs. My Tradable Net Operating Loss bill (HB1129) supports our tech and biotech startups by allowing them to convert their early net operating losses to capital they can reinvest. This bill has passed out of committee and is awaiting a floor vote.

Additionally, I recently introduced a bill to establish an Office of Employee Ownership (HB1751). This office would be housed in the Department of Community and Economic Development and would help businesses that want to convert to an employee-owned model. This initiative would strengthen local businesses and protect family-sustaining jobs right here at home.

## Strengthening Public Education

On the education front, I've been a part of efforts to reform how we fund our schools to ensure every student has the resources they need. This includes working to reform cyber charter tuition with HB1115 and HB1500 to ensure our tax dollars are used effectively. The House passed our comprehensive bill and sent it to the Senate in June.

I've also been working on legislation to increase transparency and efficiency in school transportation. Our bipartisan bill, HB1326, was introduced after months of collaboration with stakeholders and passed the House in June and has been sent to the Senate. If passed, this bill will help reduce the burden on schools and bus drivers while improving transparency into transportation funding.

## **Supporting Our Farms & Agriculture**

Another top priority is ensuring our farms are strong and sustainable. I'm working hard to get my bipartisan Food Processing Residuals legislation (HB586 and HB587) to the Governor's desk this session. It passed the House last session but didn't make it to the Senate in time.

I've also introduced several other agriculture bills to promote land preservation and support new farmers. For example, the Beginning Farmer Tax Credit Update (HB242), which passed the House this spring, is now in the Senate for consideration.

### **Protecting American Values**

I believe it's a critical moment for our nation, and I'm doing my part to protect American values like the rule of law, due process, freedom of speech, and civil liberties by ensuring accountability for all public officials

To that end, I recently introduced the Officer Visibility Act. This bill would ensure that government agents are identifiable as such, requiring federal agents to wear uniforms or ID and refrain from covering their faces. It's crucial that we know who is acting in an official capacity, especially when immigration enforcement officers are detaining individuals in our communities.
