In February, the House Labor & Industry Committee passed a bill that would create a staggered increase in the minimum wage—but it wouldn't reach \$15 until 2029! The very next day, the governor called for a \$15 minimum wage starting January 1, 2027, in his 2026–27 budget proposal. **I want to raise the wage even further, and I'm working with Sen. Tina Tartaglione to advance our legislation in the General Assembly.** Adding insult to injury, every state that borders Pennsylvania has a higher minimum wage, and 22 states have already increased their wages for 2026. **Working Pennsylvanians deserve a living wage, and I will continue fighting for you in Harrisburg until you get the hourly wage you deserve.**

2026-27 STATE BUDGET PROPOSAL

In February, I attended Gov. Shapiro's budget address, where he presented his plan for 2026–27. His \$53.3 billion proposal aims to empower the future of Philadelphians with targeted investments in education, public health and safety, affordability of everyday expenses, and a raise in the minimum wage—all while avoiding any tax increases. The increased funding for schools continues our path toward a fair and equitable

education for all students across the state, following the recommendations of the Basic Education Funding Commission. I'm especially pleased to see his proposal to increase the School Facilities Fund by an additional \$125 million in this budget to remediate and repair toxic school buildings and facilities. Kids can't learn in old buildings riddled with mold and disrepair, and this fund has been crucial in addressing those conditions.

The governor's plan leads the way on reliable, affordable energy and tax cuts to keep more money in the pockets of Pennsylvanians. It also includes significant increases in Violence Intervention and Prevention grants, expanded investments in mental and behavioral health services, and continued prioritized funding to reduce maternal mortality—all aimed at strengthening public health and safety across the state.




Once again, the governor proposes shifting revenue from the Sales and Use Tax to fund mass transit and transportation projects across the state. We passed this plan last year, but Senate Republicans refused to vote on it in their chamber. Governor Shapiro provided temporary funds to keep SEPTA running, but we need a solution that ensures recurring, sustainable funding for mass transportation. Philadelphia doesn't move without SEPTA, and I'm hopeful that our efforts this year will lead to good-faith negotiations and a lasting agreement.



And, of course, my top priority in this budget is securing an increase in the minimum wage! The governor has called for an increase to \$15 effective January 1, 2027. I support this plan, and I'm committed to pushing for even more for working Pennsylvanians.

As part of the 2025-26 state budget, I voted to give a tax break to nearly 1 million Pennsylvania families, including almost 200,000 in Philadelphia.

It is called the Working Pennsylvanians Tax Credit – because working people deserve a break!

If you qualify for the federal Earned Income Tax Credit, you automatically qualify for an additional 10% savings on your state taxes. That's money you can put toward groceries, childcare, or any other essential expenses.

Don't forget this money back in your pocket when you file your taxes.

Pennsylvania offers a state tax credit to help working families with child and dependent care costs. If you're eligible for the Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit on your federal return, you can claim a 100% match on your state taxes through the Child and Dependent Care Enhancement Tax Credit. Depending on your income and number of dependents, this credit can range from \$600 to \$2,100. I've worked in the state House to develop and expand these valuable tax credits for hardworking Philadelphia families. 
1 in 10 Pennsylvanians have unclaimed property. The House helped pass a law to allow the PA Treasury to automatically return certain unclaimed property to YOU including:

This winter has been unbearably cold, with challenging weather across the state. Thankfully, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) application period for 2025–26 is now open! Whether you rent or own your home, you could receive a cash grant ranging from \$200 to \$1,000, based on your household size, income, and fuel type. Most importantly, this is a grant—it does not have to be repaid.

To find out if you qualify—or for help applying—contact my office to make an appointment with my knowledgeable staff, who can also check if you qualify for other state and local programs. You can also apply for LIHEAP online.

Weatherize your home by sealing drafts, replacing your furnace filter, and exploring other energy-saving tools. If you're concerned about paying your heating bill, contact PECO or PGW now to learn about their assistance programs or payment plan options. Acting early is important—call your utility providers today to explore options that can help keep your service connected.
