A RESOLUTION

1 2	Recognizing the month of March 2025 as "National Social Work Month" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, For decades, the social work profession has been
4	dedicated to improving human well-being and enhancing the basic
5	needs of all individuals, especially the most vulnerable; and
6	WHEREAS, The services provided by the social work profession
7	are needed more than ever; and
8	WHEREAS, People become social workers because they have a
9	strong desire to help others and make our society a better place
10	to live for all; and
11	WHEREAS, According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, social
12	work is one of the fastest growing professions in the United
13	States; and
14	WHEREAS, Social workers have always been present in times of
15	crisis, helping individuals overcome issues such as death and
16	grief and helping individuals and communities recover from

1 natural disasters such as fires, hurricanes and earthquakes; and 2 WHEREAS, There are more than 720,000 professional social 3 workers in our nation, but that number is expected to rise to 4 more than 800,000 by 2030; and

5 WHEREAS, Social workers have helped drive significant,6 positive changes in our nation; and

7 WHEREAS, Social workers work in all parts of our society to 8 empower individuals to live to their fullest potential; and 9 WHEREAS, School social workers have worked with families and 10 schools throughout the pandemic to ensure that students reach 11 their full academic and personal potential; and

12 WHEREAS, Social workers continue to work on the front lines 13 throughout the pandemic, helping clients receive the health care 14 they need and helping loved ones overcome grief and loss; and 15 WHEREAS, For generations, social workers have advocated for 16 positive changes that have made society a better place to live, 17 including urging policymakers to adopt the minimum wage, improve

18 workplace safety and enact social safety net programs that help
19 ameliorate hunger, homelessness and poverty; and

20 WHEREAS, Social workers are one of the largest groups of 21 mental health care providers in the United States, working daily 22 to help individuals, whether in person or remotely, overcome 23 substance use disorders and mental illnesses, such as depression 24 and anxiety; and

25 WHEREAS, Social workers remain prepared to aid our nation in 26 surmounting current and forthcoming challenges, enhancing health 27 care and mental health care for everyone and encouraging 28 lawmakers to consider comprehensive reforms; therefore be it 29 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the 30 month of March 2025 as "National Social Work Month" in

A. Brief Concept

Recognizes the month of March 2025 as "National Social Work Month" in Pennsylvania.

C. Analysis of the Bill

HR 44 would have the House of Representatives recognize the month of March 2025 as "National Social Work Month" in Pennsylvania and call upon all residents of the Commonwealth to join the National Association of Social Workers in celebration and support of the social work profession.

The resolution highlights the role of social workers in helping individuals to cope with grief, connect with needed services and reach their full potential by restoring or enhancing their connections with their family and community. Additionally, it notes the work of social workers in schools and throughout the pandemic.

Effective Date:

Upon adoption by the House of Representatives.

G. Relevant Existing Laws

This is a freestanding resolution.

Social workers and clinical social workers are licensed professions governed by the Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors Act (Act 39 of 1987).

E. Prior Session (Previous Bill Numbers & House/Senate Votes)

A similar, but not identical resolution, House Resolution 344 (Hill-Evans), was adopted by the House of Representatives on March 26, 2024.

7 (1) AN EXEMPTION UNDER SUBSECTION (A) (1) SHALL REMAIN IN 8 FORCE WHILE THE PHYSICIAN IS TRAVELING WITH THE SPORTS TEAM 9 BUT SHALL BE NO LONGER THAN [TEN] 45 DAYS IN DURATION PER SPORTING EVENT. A. Brief Concept

Allows traveling team physicians from outside the United States to treat their players without a Pennsylvania medical license.

C. Analysis of the Bill

Amends Act 112 of 1985, known as **The Medical Practice Act**, to expand the licensure exemption offered to traveling team physicians from outside of Pennsylvania to include team physicians from outside the United States.

Section 13.6 of the act currently allows a physician who is licensed and in good standing in another state to practice in Pennsylvania without a PA medical license if they are only treating their own players on site at a sports competition or at a national sport training center. Traveling team doctors may not practice at any hospital, clinic or health care facility in Pennsylvania.

SB 184 adds international traveling team physicians to this licensure exemption with the same requirements and restrictions as out-of-state physicians. It also extends the maximum amount of time a traveling team physician may practice in Pennsylvania to 45 days, but may be longer with prior approval granted by the Board of Medicine.

Effective Date:

This act shall take effect immediately.

G. <u>Relevant Existing Laws</u>

Section 13.6 of The Medical Practice Act allows a physician who is licensed and in good standing in another state to practice in Pennsylvania without a PA medical license if they are only treating their own players on site at a sports competition or at a national sport training center. Traveling team doctors may not practice at any hospital, clinic or health care facility in Pennsylvania.

Team physicians may treat players under an agreement with the team members and coaching staff for a specific sporting event in Pennsylvania or may be invited by a national sport governing body to provide services at a national sport training center in the Commonwealth.

Licensure exemption under this section is valid for 10 days per sporting event with an extension of up to 20 additional days with prior written permission by the Board of Medicine. For those working at a national sport training center, their exemption is valid for a time certified by the national sport governing body with a maximum of 30 days.

E. Prior Session (Previous Bill Numbers & House/Senate Votes)

This bill was not introduced in previous sessions.
