#### Join in the Red Sand Project at www.redsandproject.org

Today, millions of people are enslaved. (Source: Global Estimates of Modern Slavery: Forced Labour and Forced Marriage, International Labour Organization, Geneva, September 2017). Take part in raising awareness for those affected by modern day slavery, including victims of human trafficking, forced labor and forced marriage.

Started by artist and activist Molly Gochman in 2014, the Red Sand Project "is a participatory artwork that uses sidewalk interventions and earthwork installations to create opportunities for people to raise questions, connect and take action against vulnerabilities that can lead to human trafficking and exploitation," according to Gochman's website. Filling the cracks in sidewalks with red sand draws attention to people "who fall through the metaphoric cracks," the artist's website states.

Join with us as we use red sand to highlight the presence of human trafficking in our community and raise awareness about how we can take steps to eradicate exploitation of vulnerable children, women and men.
