

Impact of Federal Changes

Agriculture

Community Food Programs

- USDA has paused \$500 million (nationally) in funding for The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)
 - o Greatly reduces supplies to local food banks
- USDA has also cut \$660 million (nationally) in funding for Local Food for Schools Program
- Local farmers have been impacted, as they lose sales that they would have otherwise realized

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

- The U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation may reduce SNAP by \$230 billion (nationally) over the next 10 years.
- 2 million individuals in Pennsylvania depend on SNAP to help them buy groceries, most of which are children, seniors, and individuals with disabilities.¹
- Each month, SNAP provides more than \$350 million in federal funding for food purchases.²

Education

ARP ESSER (COVID relief funds for schools)

- Trump administration rescinded prior approvals for funding extensions, which means the federal government is retaining \$183.6 million in unliquidated funds that schools were planning to spend (more than \$5 billion provided to PA schools through ARP ESSER)
 - PDE posted the full list, but of note in Chester County:

- Coatesville Area SD lost* \$770,196
- Renaissance Academy CS lost* \$319,432
- *Gov. Shapiro joined a multi-state lawsuit that challenges the legality of this reversal

Administrative Resources

- U.S. Department of Education process initiated to eliminate half of the US DOE workforce
 Could impact ability to process student loans, administer funds, protect civil rights, etc.
- Head Start closing 5 of the 12 regional offices that administer the program (Dept. of Health and Human Services)

Executive Orders with ambiguous meaning and impact

- Broadly, four different orders call for rescinding federal funding to educational entities which are perceived to be out of compliance with the administration's objectives regarding
 - Eliminating <u>COVID-19 vaccine mandates</u> in schools;
 - Eliminating <u>"racial indoctrination"</u> in K-12 curricula and teacher training/certification; and
 - Eliminating <u>"gender ideology extremism"</u> in schools and <u>banning transgender athletes</u> from participating in women's and girls' sports
- Another <u>executive order</u> has directed the Department of Education to issue guidance on how states can use federal grants for "educational alternatives" (i.e. private education, including religious schools)

Health and Human Services

Terminated Health & Research Federal Funding

- Beginning in March, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services terminated funding for research and certain Health department programs.
- Approximately \$12 million in funding was terminated for universities conducting research in Pennsylvania.³

- Over \$500 million in public health related funding was terminated. This funding is used for:
 - o Immunizations and vaccines for children,
 - Prevention and control of infectious diseases,
 - Addressing health disparities among populations,

- Mental health services, and
- Substance use disorder treatment.

Medicaid Funding Impacts

- The U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation that would cut Medicaid by \$880 billion (nationally) over the next 10 years.
- In Pennsylvania, 3 million people (1 in every 4 people) are currently covered by Medicaid.

Federal Health Insurance Subsidies

- Pennsylvania's uninsured rate prior to the Affordable Care Act (ACA) in 2010 was 10%.
- Currently, the uninsured rate is 5.3%.
- Currently federal subsidies, available under the ACA, allow 497,000 people to buy affordable health insurance coverage from Pennsylvania's state-based marketplace (<u>Pennie</u>).
- Federal health insurance subsidies will end in December 2025. Without an extension from the U.S. Congress these subsidies will not be available starting in January 2016 and many individuals will not be able to afford their health insurance payments and will need to terminate their coverage. This will mean more individuals that are uninsured.

Hospital Impacts

- Currently, Medicaid expansion covers 750,000 low-income individuals for their health insurance. The income limit for a household of 4 is currently \$44,367.⁴
- In fiscal year 2022/23, hospitals had \$791 million in the cost of providing care to patients that they are not able to pay.⁵ By providing coverage in Medicaid, hospitals have seen a 27.7% reduction in the cost of providing this care.⁶
