My first year as your state representative is officially in the books. So, I want to start this newsletter by THANKING YOU for trusting me with the responsibility of serving and being your voice in Harrisburg. It's been an exhilarating, humbling, occasionally frustrating, but ultimately rewarding experience traversing the political arena. And I look forward to spending the rest of 2020 working hard to make lives better for all of us in the 163rd Legislative District.

In 2019, I introduced four bills and co-sponsored 162 more. I cast 1,178 votes (perfect voting attendance), helped bring in \$7.9 million in state grants to the district, hosted 24 community events and found over \$285K in unclaimed property.

I plan to keep it going in 2020. If you sign up for my regular emails (find out HOW to sign up for my eblasts on the back page of this newsletter) you'll read about more funding coming into our district, all of my upcoming events, details on the legislation I'm most passionate about, and, of course, pictures of me and my family spending time out and about and meeting so many of you.

THE 2020 CENSUS

Every 10 years, the United States conducts a census. This count of U.S. residents helps determine how \$675 billion is spent by the federal government and how Pennsylvania will be represented in Congress for the next decade.

This year, it will be even easier to make sure you and your family are counted. You can respond online, by paper or over the phone. The Census will be printed in English and Spanish; accommodations are made for those with visual or hearing impairments; and telephone assistance will be available in 13 languages.

An accurate count is incredibly important for all of us in the state. Many things depend on the results of the Census, including the number of representatives that Pennsylvania will have in Congress and the amount of money the commonwealth will receive from the federal government for support services for seniors, children and lower-income residents.

It's important to know that it is completely anonymous. Your information isn't shared, and no one will be able to follow up with you about anything on any basis.

So, please, be on the lookout for invitations to complete the 2020 Census starting in mid-March. Once you receive your invitation, respond either online, by phone or through the mail. April 1 is officially Census Day, a key reference date. When completing the Census, you will include everyone living in your home on April 1, 2020.



LEGISLATION I'VE RECENTLY INTRODUCED

CAPS ON EXECUTIVE BONUSES IN

BANKRUPTCY: By paying out bonuses to executives while their companies are going through bankruptcy, the company is rewarding mismanagement while their workers look for new jobs. This practice is especially problematic when such corporations have previously received some public benefit to help them stay in business as employers.

Rather than giving executives bonuses, companies should be focused on securing the livelihoods of their workers while undergoing bankruptcy proceedings.

My legislation would prohibit companies entering bankruptcy from paying out bonuses to highly compensated employees (whose annual compensation exceeds \$250,000) and insiders when those companies have received a public benefit.

Wealthy corporate executives and insiders should not be permitted to cash out during a bankruptcy while workers are laid off and struggle to pay the bills.

PROTECTION FROM ABUSE HEARINGS:

UNPAID LEAVE: In the U.S., one in four women and one in seven men have suffered severe physical violence by an intimate partner. In 2018 in Pennsylvania, nearly 48,000 new temporary protection from abuse (PFA) orders were filed, with Delaware County having the second-highest number of filings per capita compared to other PA counties. Despite our efforts, 123 Pennsylvanians lost their lives to domestic violence in 2018.

I firmly believe that one of the most important duties of government is to keep our people safe from harm. This legislation would support victims of domestic abuse in their attempts to receive a PFA order to protect them from further abuse. It would require employers to provide unpaid leave for employees who attend a PFA hearing if an employee is a victim or is providing testimony on behalf of a victim.

This would help to ensure that all victims of domestic abuse are able to make their case and receive the protection they deserve.



I spoke at a Domestic Violence Awareness Rally this fall where we commemorated the 123 victims who lost their lives to domestic violence in PA in 2018. If you or someone you love needs help, call the national helpline at 1-800-799-SAFE.

PROHIBITING GIFTS FROM PHARMACEUTICAL

COMPANIES: A recent study by the University of Pittsburgh found that health care providers who receive gifts from opioid pharmaceutical companies were more likely to prescribe higher amounts of opioid prescriptions. The study showed that from 2014-2016, 18 pharmaceutical companies reported that they had promoted opioid products to doctors with gifts and other payments.

The opioid epidemic has reached every corner of our commonwealth, and we need to do everything we can to help solve this crisis. For this reason, I introduced legislation that would limit the amounts of gifts a pharmaceutical manufacturer may give to a health care provider to just \$50 in a calendar year. With this bill, we would limit the direct influence a company has over health care professionals.

By providing oversight, we would take pressure off of our health care providers and place the focus on the wellbeing of the patients.

FUNDING TO HELP THE 163rd
