Level-Up Education Plan Signed by Governor

Pennsylvania ranks 44th in the nation in education funding support. This places a huge burden on property taxes, which affects homeowners and small business owners. It also affects our students, especially those in districts like Allentown where underfunding is most pronounced. That is why I introduced legislation to provide an additional \$100 million to the 100 most financially distressed schools in Pennsylvania. This proposal was adopted, and this will provide the Allentown School District with an additional \$16.9 million in funding over last year. State wide, support for education will increase a record \$300 million compared to the 2020-21 budget. It is a HUGE investment in our schools, and I am thrilled to see this measure approved by the General Assembly and signed into law by Gov. Tom Wolf.



Modern medicine has made it possible to protect yourself from COVID-19. Safe, effective vaccines are available and plentiful in our community. According to the CDC, 99% of all COVID deaths are happening to people who were not vaccinated against the disease.

COVID-19 will not magically go away. It requires us to roll up our sleeves, do our part and get vaccinated. My wife and I have done it. My staff has done it. If you have not, please, consider your health, your family's health, your community's health and our nation's health. It has never been easier to do it.

Affordable Health Care Available in PA

Thanks to President Biden's leadership and the American Rescue Plan, access to more affordable health insurance is possible in Pennsylvania. The American Rescue Plan includes help to reduce your premiums or perhaps eliminate them completely.

Pennie—Do you buy insurance on your own for you or your family? Are you looking to purchase insurance for you and your family? If so, visit www.Pennie.com to get started. Open enrollment begins in November and runs through January, but special enrollment is available if you have lost health coverage, moved, got married or are having a baby.

Older Pennsylvanians—Medicare is a great source of security, but it does not cover everything. Medicare Advantage Plans and Medicare Supplements provide options to help with services not covered by Medicare. My office hosts a volunteer trained by PA MEDI to help navigate the options available to you. He begins offering help during Medicare open enrollment in late-October through early December. Appointments are required. Call the office to set up your appointment during open enrollment.

PennDOT & Vital Records

My office is here to help in getting the best results possible for processing your PennDOT paperwork. If you have paperwork that needs to be mailed to Harrisburg for processing, please consider bringing it to my office. We can bypass the mailroom and track the documents when they arrive. This includes vehicle registration renewals, driver's license or photo ID renewal and processing for disability placards, as well as Pennsylvania birth and death Certificates. Mental Health Corner

Mental Health Legislation: Addressing Service Shortage

For years, a huge obstacle to mental health care has been availability of professionals. There are simply not enough people available to serve the mental health needs of this nation. Working with Rep. Jeanne McNeill (D), Rep. Jason Ortitay (R), Rep. Rosemary Brown (R), and Rep. Pam Snyder (D), I introduced legislation to establish and administer a program to help educate, train and deploy more mental health professionals into underserved areas throughout Pennsylvania. Mental illness doesn't care how you vote. It doesn't matter your age, race or gender. Nor does mental illness care where you live, work or learn. The truth is mental illness can impact anyone at any time. This legislation shows the bipartisan energy to work toward solutions on an issue that confronts all Americans.

PA Mental Health Guide

Your mental health is important. Just as we strive for better physical wellness, we can take steps to improve our mental health. This means different needs for different people. No matter your challenges, there are options to help you. Pennsylvania has a Mental Health Resource Guide available to help find treatment, provide support in a crisis and identify services. Disability Placard Assistance Available

Even if you do not have a car or driver's license, you can still have a disability placard to use for when somebody is giving you a ride to the grocery store or the doctor! When sending in the application for your first placard or to renew a placard, my office can help expedite the process. If you lose your placard or need to replace a damaged one, my office can also help. Just give a call (610-821-5577) and we will determine the best way to get your placard request processed.



Unused License Plate

It is important to know unused license plates may continue to be your responsibility even after transferring the title. This means you may be responsible for anything that happens with that license plate, including things like parking tickets or tolls.

When selling a car, if you don't plan to reuse the license plate, the safest thing to do is to retain possession of the license plate and return it to PennDOT through my Allentown office. We'll ensure safe delivery to PennDOT at no expense to you. If you have any questions about a plate you still hold, please give my office a call (610-821-5577).


LANTA Bus Passes for Seniors

LANTA provides free fares to seniors 65 or older to ride city transit buses (not LANTaVan/Metro Plus vans). To apply for a Senior ID card, give my office a call and we'll mail you an application or download an application at www.lantabus.com/lanta-senior-citizen-id-card.

SEPTA Senior Pass

Do you use the SEPTA regional rail or bus system while traveling in the Philadelphia metro area? If you are 65 or older, you can do so for FREE using the SEPTA Senior Fare Card. This includes all transit routes (bus, trolley, trackless trolley, Broad St/Broad Ridge Spur, Market Frankford Line/Norristown High Speed Line). To apply, call my office to make an appointment. Applications must be done in person so we can take a picture. SEPTA will process the application and mail a Senior

Fare Card to you directly. Please plan on giving yourself 2-3 weeks before you make your next trip to ensure adequate processing time.

Voting Information and Rights

Vote by Mail

Request your ballot online at VotesPA.com or call my office NOW (610-821-5577) to request a vote-by-mail application. Per Lehigh County Voter Registration, ballots will be mailed in early October. Follow the instructions for completing the ballot, placing the completed ballot in the correct envelope, signing it and returning. If you are mailing the ballot back to the voter registration office, give yourself 2-3 weeks to make sure it gets there. If you cannot get the ballot back to the voter registration office with a few weeks to spare, you can drop it at the 24/7 drop box at 17 S. 7th St. in Allentown. Ballots must be returned by mail or the person casting the vote. You cannot ask somebody else to deliver it for you.



Vote in Person: Precincts for the General Election

COVID-19 moved many polling locations for the 2020 elections and 2021 primary election. It's hard to say if every location will continue or if there will be changes again. Most places in the 2021 primary were the same location as the 2020 General Election. With more locations reopening their doors to service, and with schools planning to reopen in the fall, it's possible locations might change again. Real ID Deadline

Extended

Earlier this year, the Biden Administration announced REAL ID enforcement would be delayed until May 3, 2023. REAL ID will be required at that time to board domestic



commercial flights, enter military bases or enter federal facilities that require ID at the door. It is not required to drive, vote, access hospitals, visit the post office, access federal courts or receive Social Security or veterans' benefits. Valid US Passports are considered REAL ID. For more information about obtaining REAL ID in Pennsylvania, visit dmv.pa.gov/REALID. If you are looking to obtain REAL ID in person, visit the PennDOT Driver License Center at 1101 MacArthur Road in Whitehall, which is open Tuesday through Saturday, 8:30 AM until 4:15 PM. My office has a REAL ID Guide available for more information. Give us a call (610-821-5577) and we can get one to you.

Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program Deadline Extended

The deadline for Pennsylvania's 2020 Property Tax/Rent Rebate was extended to December 31, 2021 and my office is ready to help you file.

Residents of assisted living facilities may be eligible if they reside in a facility which pays property taxes and meet the income limits for renters.

We've learned that we can help most people with the rebate forms over the phone. Call my Allentown office (610-821-5577) to get started, set up an appointment or request the forms to file on your own.
