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## FIGHTING FOR OUR VALUES IN HARRISBURG

Every week that I'm in Harrisburg I'm doing everything I can to fight for the values that matter to us. I want to make sure you know where I stand on some key issues that are going to impact our state moving forward. Please don't hesitate to contact my office to discuss any of these issues or any other issue that is important to you.

- Pushing for more criminal justice reform: Since we launched Clean Slate in 2019, we've sealed over 1.2 million Pennsylvanians' records. This helps them get the second chance they deserve. I'm hopeful we'll expand Clean Slate this year to seal even more records. I'm also continuing to work on probation reform and equitable treatment for formally incarcerated individuals.
- Protecting your right to vote: It's unfortunate, but over the past several years we've seen unprecedented efforts to make it harder to vote. This is wholly undemocratic and I'm working to ensure that these attempts to silence your voice don't succeed in Pennsylvania. I'm cosponsoring legislation from our Democratic House Leader Joanna McClinton that would make it easier to vote and protect your rights at the ballot box.
- Supporting women's health: As more and more states push women's health backward, I'll continue to stand up and fight for increased access to the health care options women need. We've come a long way in just my lifetime, but we need to ensure the rights we've fought for continue to be available.



Recovery from COVID-19: Thanks to President Joe Biden, the American Rescue Plan sent billions of dollars to Pennsylvania to help us recover from COVID-19. We need to use this federal money to invest in our communities, our schools, our businesses, and our state.

# Gov. Wolf's Budget Proposal A Progressive Investment For Pa.



In February, Gov. Tom Wolf unveiled his final budget proposal for Pennsylvania. When the governor took office in 2015, Pennsylvania was faced with a severe budget shortfall. Now, with Pennsylvania having a record surplus, Gov. Wolf is proposing a historic investment in our state that will help strengthen our schools, improve our communities and lead to a growing economy.

This budget looks to invest in all levels of education, from pre-K through K-12 and into postsecondary education, to ensure that Pennsylvania's students have all the resources they need to be successful. It would make Pennsylvania more attractive to workers and businesses by raising our embarrassingly low

minimum wage and investing in job training to put more high-skilled workers into the job market. It would support criminal justice reform by expanding our Clean Slate law, which I authored with Rep. Sheryl Delozier several years ago, to give more Pennsylvanians their second chance.

It does all those things and so much more. The bottom line is this: we're faced with a unique opportunity to invest in our state and our people. We have a budget surplus the state hasn't seen in over a decade. To simply hide your tax dollars away in a rainy-day fund is unacceptable when it's already been raining for too many Pennsylvanians. I look forward to supporting this budget proposal and look forward to delivering for Pennsylvania.

### Key Budget Investments and policies

- \$1.55 billion increase in basic education funding
- This includes a \$411 million increase for Philadelphia schools
- \$200 million increase in special education funding
- \$60 million increase for Pre-K Counts
- \$75 million increase for PA State System of Higher Education (PASSHE)
- \$200 million for a needsbased scholarship program for PASSHE universities
- \$14 million increase for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Increased minimum wage to \$12 per hour climbing to \$15 per hour
- Expand Clean Slate program to give more Pennsylvanians their second chance

## PROVIDING HELP FOR NURSES AND HOSPITALS

Earlier this year, the legislature passed, and Gov. Tom Wolf signed, a bill that delivers \$225 million in federal funding to help nurses and hospitals across the state. Our hospitals continue to be strained and staffed by nurses and doctors who have sacrificed so much throughout this pandemic. The past two years have been hard on all of us, but they've given more of themselves than could ever be repaid. This is just a start toward ensuring that hospitals have the staff they need, and that staff has adequate support to do their job as best they can.

#### This law delivers:

- \$100 million to hospitals to develop and employ staff recruitment efforts.
- \$110 million to support staff recruitment at hospitals who work closely with behavioral health patients.
- \$15 million to a dedicated Student Loan Relief for Nurses Program.



# Are you at risk of having your water shut off?

Help is available. Learn if you qualify at: www.dhs.pa.gov/WaterHelp

If you're at risk of having your water shut off, please know that the Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is now accepting applications. LIHWAP is a temporary emergency program to help low-income families pay overdue water bills and avoid having their water service shut off. LIHWAP crisis grants may be available to you if you have an emergency situation and are in danger of losing water service. Pennsylvania's Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is still accepting applications to help individuals at risk of losing their heat stay warm. LIHEAP provides a cash grant to low-income individuals who are in danger of being without heat or who have experienced a heating crisis such as a broken furnace. 
Older and disabled Pennsylvanians can now apply for the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program. Remember, you can now use an online filing option via www.mypath.pa.gov to electronically submit your application. You can also contact my office to get your Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program instruction booklet to learn which information you'll need.

The rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 annually for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded. Spouses, personal representatives, or estates may also file rebate claims on behalf of claimants who lived at least one day in 2021 and meet all other eligibility criteria.

Joanna McClinton in presenting a state grant for more than \$2.6 million to Bartram's Garden that we helped secure for our communities.
