IMPACT OF PA SMALL BUSINESSES

The following general facts are about small business and entrepreneurship in Pennsylvania. **These statistics, their sources, and more are available in the full Pennsylvania small business profile at** (SBA.gov. Pennsylvania Small Business Profile 2017).

- Pennsylvania is home to 1 million small businesses, and employs 2.5 million individuals or about half (46.8 percent) of the state's private workforce.
- Almost all Pennsylvania businesses with employees qualify as small businesses, making up 99.6
 percent of businesses in the state.
- The economic impact of small businesses across the commonwealth is evident in all business sectors, from professional services, real estate, and construction to health care, retail, manufacturing, and education.
- A total of 15,758 companies exported goods from Pennsylvania in 2014. Among these, 14,039 (or 89.1 percent) were small firms; they generated 32.2 percent of Pennsylvania's \$36.4 billion in total known exports.
- Pennsylvania's 2015 growth rate of 2.8 percent was up from the 2014 rate of 1.8 percent.
- Small business employment constitutes 63-100% of private employment in 16 PA counties

The typical Pennsylvania business:

- Employs 20 employees or less
- Offers some type of professional, scientific, or technical service

The typical Pennsylvania small business employee:

Works at a health care and social assistance small business

2. Register Your Business

3. Explore Small Diverse Business Resources

In Pennsylvania, Small Diverse Businesses (SDBs) are defined as those that are disabled-, women-, minority-, LGBT-, or veteran-owned. Business ownership should be accessible to all, and we are dedicated to creating more opportunities for our SDBs. 

SMALL DIVERSE BUSINESS CAPITAL ACCESS PROGRAM

EMPOWERING DIVERSE ENTREPRENEURS



Offered through the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and administered by the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority (PIDA), the Small Diverse Business Capital Access (SDBCA) Loan Program provides low-interest loans and lines of credit to small, diverse businesses that commit to creating and retaining full-time jobs within Pennsylvania. Loan applications are packaged and underwritten by a network of certified economic development organizations (CEDOs) that partner with PIDA to administer the program.

ELIGIBILITY & USE

SDBCA financing can be used for:

- · Land and building acquisitions
- Construction and renovation costs
- · Machinery and equipment purchases
- · Working capital and accounts receivable lines of credit

FUNDING & PARTICIPATION

The maximum participation amount is determined by a variety of factors, including the proposed use of SDBCA funds, the amount of matching financing from sources outside of SDBCA, and the number of full-time jobs to be created or retained. Generally, a 50 percent match is required — however, some exceptions may apply.

WHO'S ELIGIBLE?

PA based, for profit
businesses, certified by the
PA Department of General
Services (DGS) as
minority, woman, veteran,
or service disabled veteran
owned small businesses with
100 or fewer full time
employees worldwide.



LOAN SIZE

- Term loans up to \$200,000
- Lines of credit up to \$100,000

INTEREST RATES AND FEES

- The interest rate is a fixed rate and based on market conditions. Contact PIDA for the current rate.
- The borrower is responsible for applicable closing costs and associated fees.

MATURITY AND RENEWALS

- Up to 15 years: Land and building acquisition; construction and renovation costs.
- Up to 10 years: Machinery & equipment purchases.
- Line of credit maturities can be up to 12 months.
- Lines of credit can be renewed on an annual basis up to a maximum of six years upon the review and approval of PIDA/DCED.

COLLATERAL

Collateral is required and is based on the asset being financed.

- A variety of factors are taken into consideration when assessing collateral. Examples of collateral include but are not limited to: mortgages, machinery and equipment, inventory, receivables, blanket lien against business assets, etc.
- Personal guarantees are required by the principal owners, which typically is limited to individuals with 20 percent or more ownership in the operating entity.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Please contact your local Certified Economic Development Organization (CEDO) service provider to package the Loan application.

BUSINESS REGISTRATION CHECKLIST



Use our Business Registration Checklist to ensure you've got all your bases covered for basic registration in Pennsylvania.

1.	Confirm your business name is available.
2.	Confirm your professional licensure is current.* *Only applicable to Professional LLCs and Professional Corporations. All other business structures, skip to step 3.
3.	Apply for a Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN).* *If you're a foreign registered company and already have an FEIN, skip to step 4.
4.	Register your business structure in Pennsylvania.* *Sole Proprietors do not have to register their business structure.
5.	Register your Fictitious Name.* *Only required if operating under a name that is not the Legal Name of the business or sole proprietor.
6.	Register for state tax and employer accounts.* *Employers must comply with Act 32 on Local Earned Income Tax, and report employee information to the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry.
7.	Check for special registrations, if applicable.
8.	Check with the local municipality concerning taxes, zoning requirements, local licenses and permits, and any other regulations.
